Supreme Court rules bills unconstitutional

Friday, the Youth in Government Supreme Court ruled HB71 by Rep. Taylor Tindall of Gadsden unconstitutional due to the violation of the 8th and 4th amendments. The bill supports replacing lethal injection with a firing squad for those charged with murder.

"The Supreme Court decides the constitutionality of bills," Justices Jeffery Saunders and Justin Law said. Saunders has been a part of Youth Legislature for four years and a justice for one, while Law has been a justice for all four years. They do it because they enjoy having a unique voice that cannot be possessed by anyone else.

Chief Justice Jim Schillaci has attended Youth Legislature for three years and this is his second being a part of the Supreme Court. If Schillaci could give any advice for those participating it would be "don't be nervous or scared, because it's really a lot of fun."

All together the Supreme Court ruled four bills unconstitutional.
